Talk to Recent Grads

This kind of research-based project is generally meant to encourage students' critical thinking and problem-solving abilities, and also their oral communication skills, media literacy, teamwork, planning and self-reliance skills. This helps prepare students for work life after they graduate. Students who are confident and enthusiastic about their projects tend to get better grades. It is also important to stay motivated by setting attainable goals and progressing gradually.
